

Chapter 1 Getting Started

Introduction

This chapter explains how to set up the MC9500-K for the first time.

Unpacking


Carefully remove all protective material from the MC9500-K and save the shipping container for later storage and shipping.

Verify that you received the following:

- MC9500-K mobile computer
- 4800 mAh Lithium-ion battery
- Regulatory Guide
- Quick Start Guide.

Inspect the equipment for damage. If any equipment is missing or damaged, contact the Motorola Enterprise Mobility Support center immediately. See *page xviii* for contact information.

Prior to using the MC9500-K for the first time, remove the protective shipping film that covers the keypad and battery display.





Getting Started

To start using the MC9500-K for the first time:

- Install a microSD card (optional)
- Install the SIM card (MC9596 only)
- Install the battery.
- Charge the MC9500-K.

Installing a microSD Card

The microSD card slot provides secondary non-volatile storage. The slot is located under the battery pack. Refer to the documentation provided with the card for more information, and follow the manufacturer's recommendations for use.



CAUTION Follow proper ESD precautions to avoid damaging the microSD card. Proper ESD precautions include, but are not limited to, working on an ESD mat and ensuring that the operator is properly grounded.

To install the microSD card:

1. Remove the SD card cover using flathead screwdriver.





Figure 1-2 SD Card Cover Removal


- 2. Slide the microSD card holder door to the left to open.
- 3. Lift microSD card holder door.

4. Insert the microSD card into card holder door ensuring that the card slides into the holding tabs on each side of the door.






Figure 1-4 Insert microSD Card in Holder

- 5. Close the card holder door and slide to the right to lock into place.
- 6. Align the SD card cover over the access hole and press down until it snaps into place.

Installing the SIM Card

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NOTE MC9596 configuration only.

GSM phone service requires a Subscriber Identification Module (SIM) card, or smart card. Obtain the card from the your service provider. The card fits into the MC9596 and can contain the following information:


- Mobile phone service provider account details.
- Information regarding service access and preferences.
- Contact information, which can be moved to Contacts on the MC9596.
- Any additional services to which you have subscribed.

NOTE For more information about SIM cards, refer to the service provider's documentation.

To install the SIM card:

1. Remove SIM card cover using flathead screwdriver.

2. Slide the SIM card holder door to the left to unlock.

3. Lift the SIM card holder door.




Figure 1-6 Lifting the SIM Cover




Figure 1-7 Inserting the SIM Card

4. Insert the SIM card, as shown in *Figure 1-7* into the holder door with the contacts facing down and the card notch facing up.

- 5. Close SIM card holder door and slide to the right to lock into place.
- 6. Align the SIM card cover over the access hole and press down until it snaps into place.
- 7. Install the battery.
- 8. After completing initial MC9596 setup or after replacing a SIM card:
 - a. Press the red Power button.
 - b. On the Today screen, tap Wireless Manager.
 - c. Ensure Phone is on.
 - d. Press the red Power button to suspend the MC9596.
 - e. Perform a warm boot. See Resetting the MC9500-K on page 3-3.
 - f. Make a call to verify cellular connection.



Installing the Battery

To install the battery:

- 1. Insert the battery, top first, into the battery compartment.
- 2. Press the battery down into the battery compartment until the battery release latches snap into place.





3. The MC9500-K powers up automatically after inserting the battery, if the battery has been charged previously.

Charging the Battery

CAUTION Ensure that you follow the guidelines for battery safety described in *Battery Safety Guidelines on page 9-2*.

Before using the MC9500-K for the first time, charge the battery using either a charging cable or a cradle:

NOTE For cable and cradle setup and charging procedures refer to the MC9500-K Series Mobile


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- USB Charging Cable
- Charge Only Cable
- Single Bay USB Cradle
- Four Bay Charge Only Cradle

Computer Integrator Guide.

• Four Bay Ethernet Cradle.

Align and hook the MC9500-K interface pocket onto the cradle's or cable's cleat. The battery automatically begins charging. See *Table 1-1* for charging indications. The 4800 mAh battery fully charges in less than six hours.

The MC9500-K is equipped with a memory backup battery which automatically charges from the fully-charged main battery. When using the MC9500-K for the first time, the backup battery requires approximately 36 hours to fully charge. This is also true any time the backup battery is discharged, which occurs when the main battery is removed for several hours. The backup battery retains RAM data in memory for at least 15 minutes (at room temperature) when the MC9500-K's main battery is removed. When the MC9500-K reaches a very low battery state, the combination of main battery and backup battery retains RAM data in memory for at least 48 hours.

Charging Temperature

Charge batteries in temperatures from 0°C to 40°C (32°F to 104°F). Note that charging is intelligently controlled by the MC9500-K.

To accomplish this, for small periods of time, the MC9500-K alternately enables and disables battery charging to keep the battery at acceptable temperatures. The MC9500-K indicates when charging is disabled due to abnormal temperatures via its LED. See *Table 1-1*.

Powering On the MC9500-K

After the MC9500-K is connected to power the splash screen displays for about a minute as the MC9500-K initializes its flash file system, then the calibration window appears.

Calibrating the Screen



NOTE The Calibration screen can be accessed by pressing CTRL key - BKSP key or tapping Start > Settings > Screen > Align Screen button.

To calibrate the screen so the cursor on the touch screen aligns with the tip of the stylus:

- 1. Remove the stylus from its holder on the side of the MC9500-K.
- 2. Carefully press and briefly hold the tip of stylus on the center of each target that appears on the screen.
- 3. Repeat as the target moves around the screen, then tap the screen to continue.


Replacing the Battery

To replace the battery:




CAUTION Suspend the MC9500-K prior to removing the battery. Failure to properly remove the battery may cause the MC9500-K to cold boot and potential loss of data.

- 1. If the MC9500-K is in suspend mode, press the red **Power** button to wake the device.
- Press the red Power button to suspend the MC9500-K.
- 3. Wait for red Decode LED to turn on and then turn off.
- 4. Unhook the handstrap.
- 5. Press the two battery release latches to release the battery. The battery ejects slightly.



Battery Latch



- 6. Lift the battery from the MC9500-K.
- 7. Insert the replacement battery, top first, into the battery compartment in the back of the MC9500-K.
- 8. Press the battery down until the battery release latches snap into place.

The MC9500-K powers up after inserting the battery.

Removing the microSD Card

To remove an microSD card:



CAUTION Suspend the MC9500-K prior to removing the battery. Failure to properly remove the battery may cause the MC9500-K to cold boot and potential loss of data.

- 1. If the MC9500-K is in suspend mode, press the red Power button to wake the device.
- 2. Press the red **Power** button to suspend the MC9500-K.
- 3. Wait for red Decode LED to turn on and then turn off.
- 4. Unhook the handstrap.
- 5. Remove the battery.
- 6. Remove the SD card cover using a flathead screwdriver.
- 7. Slide the SD card holder door to the left to unlock.
- 8. Lift the microSD card holder door.
- 9. Remove microSD card from holder.
- 10. Close the microSD card holder door.
- 11. Slide the microSD card holder door to the right to lock into place.
- 12. Align the SD card cover over the access hole and press down until it snaps into place.
- 13. Replace the battery.

Removing the SIM Card

To remove an SIM card:



CAUTION Suspend the MC9500-K prior to removing the battery. Failure to properly remove the battery may cause the MC9500-K to cold boot and potential loss of data.

- 1. If the MC9500-K is in suspend mode, press the red Power button to wake the device.
- 2. Press the red **Power** button to suspend the MC9500-K.
- 3. Wait for red Decode LED to turn on and then turn off.
- 4. Unhook the handstrap.
- 5. Remove the battery.
- 6. Remove the SIM card cover using a flathead screwdriver.
- 7. Slide the SIM card holder door to the left to unlock.
- 8. Lift the SIM card holder door.
- 9. Remove SIM card from holder.

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- 10. Close the SIM card holder door.
- **11.** Slide the SIM card holder door to the right to lock into place.
- **12.** Align the SIM card cover over the access hole and press down until it snaps into place.
- 13. Replace the battery.

Chapter 2 Battery Management

Introduction

This chapter provides information on battery functionality, battery status indications, charging the MC9500-K, charging spare batteries and power saving techniques.

Battery Functionality

The 4800 mAh battery provides power to the MC9500-K and contains charging and status indications on the front of the battery. The indicators function differently depending upon the battery mode and allow the user to determine the health of the battery.




Figure 2-1 Battery

Charging Status LED indicates the charging status and health of the battery. The Charge Level Indicator indicates an unhealthy battery and the charge level of the battery.

Battery Health

A battery becomes unhealthy when the **Battery Usage Indication** reach a predefined threshold (end of usable life).



NOTE The point at which a battery becomes unhealthy may vary depending upon the environment and charging conditions

The **Battery Usage Threshold** value can be changed. See the *MC9500-K Mobile Computer Integrator Guide* for more information.




Figure 2-3 Unhealthy Battery Indication

When the battery becomes unhealthy, a dialog box displays on the MC9500-K. When this appears, tap **Dismiss**. Replace the battery as soon as possible. The battery Charge Level indicator display an "X" when the battery becomes unhealthy (see *Figure 2-3*). When charging an unhealthy battery in the MC9500-K, the Battery Status LED blinks red.

Battery Status

The MC9500-K battery provides status information on the front of the battery that allows the user to make determination on what battery to use. The battery status indications vary depending upon the mode of the battery:

- Installed in an MC9500-K
- In a charger
- stand-alone.

Installed in an MC9500-K

NOTE The Charge Level indicator does not display the charge level while the MC9500-K is charging.




Figure 2-4 Battery in MC9500-K

When the 4800 mAh battery is installed in the MC9500-K, the user can view the charge level (with Status button press) and health of the battery (see *Figure 2-4*). The Battery Status LED is disabled when the battery is installed in the MC9500-K. If the battery is unhealthy, the Charge Level indicator displays an "X" (see *Figure 2-3*).

Press the Status button to display the current battery charge level. It will display for five seconds and then turn off. *Table 2-1* list the Charge Level indications when the Status button is pressed.

NOTE The battery front panel is not visible when the MC9500-K is charging in a cradle. The battery front panel is visible when charging with a charging cable. The Charge Level indicator displays a "charging in mobile computer" indication (see *Table 2-2*).

In a Charger

When the battery is in a Single Slot Battery Charger, Four Slot Battery Charger or Vehicle Battery Charger, the battery charging status and health is indicated on the front of the battery. If the charger is not powered, the battery acts as if it is in stand-alone mode. See *Stand-alone on page 2-8* for more information.

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


Figure 2-6 Battery in Single Slot Battery Charger

The Battery Status LED displays the current state of charging as described in *Table 2-4*. The Charge Level indicator displays the charge level of a healthy battery as described in *Table 2-1*.

With an unhealthy battery, an "X" appears on the display. To view the charge level, press the Status button. The display indicates the level of charge. After five seconds the display reverts to the "X" indication.

Stand-alone

When the battery is not installed in an MC9500-K or a charger, the charge status and health of the battery displays on the battery front panel. If the battery is unhealthy, an "X" appears in the Charge Level indicator. Press the Status button to view the health and charge level of the battery. The Battery Status LED lights and the Charge Level indicator reverts to the previous display. See *Table 2-5* for Battery Status LED and Charge Level indicator descriptions.

When the MC9500-K reaches a very low battery state, the combination of main battery and backup battery retains RAM data in memory for at least 36 hours.

To charge the battery, use either a cradle or charging cable. For cable and cradle setup and charging procedures refer to the *MC9500-K Mobile Computer Integrator Guide*.

To charge the battery:

- 1. Connect the charging accessory to the appropriate power source. See *MC9500-K Series Mobile Computer Integrator Guide* for setup information.
- Align and hook the MC9500-K interface pocket onto the cradle's or cable's cleat. The MC9500-K begins charging. The Charging/Battery Status LED blinks while charging, then turns solid when fully charged (LED color depends upon health of the battery). See *Table 2-6* for charging indications. The 4800 mAh battery fully charges in less than six hours.

Charging a Spare Battery

Charge a spare battery using one of the following accessories:

- Single Slot Battery Charger
- Four Slot Battery Charger
- Vehicle Battery Charger.

To charge a spare battery:

- 1. Ensure the charger is connected to an appropriate power source.
- 2. Insert the spare battery into the charger. The spare battery begins charging.




Figure 2-7 Spare Battery in Single Slot Battery Charger

Charging Temperature

Charge batteries in temperatures from 0°C to 40°C (32°F to 104°F). Note that charging is intelligently controlled by the MC9500-K.

To accomplish this, for small periods of time, the MC9500-K alternately enables and disables battery charging to keep the battery at acceptable temperatures. The MC9500-K indicates when charging is disabled due to abnormal temperatures via its LED.

Power Saving Techniques

Observe the following battery saving tips:

- Leave the MC9500-K connected to AC power at all times when not in use.
- Set the MC9500-K to turn off after a short period of non-use.
- Set the backlight to turn off after a short period of non-use.
- Turn off all wireless activities when not in use.

Changing the Power Settings

To set the MC9500-K to turn off after a short period of non-use:

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Power icon > Advanced tab.
- 2. Select the **On battery power: Turn off device if not used for** check box and select a value from the drop-down list.
- 3. Select ok.

Changing the Backlight Settings

To change the backlight settings in order to conserve more battery power:

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Backlight icon > Battery Power tab.
- 2. Select the Disable backlight if device is not used for check box and select a value from the drop-down list.
- 3. Select the Brightness tab.
- 4. Tap the **Disable backlight** check box to turn off the display backlight, or use the slider to set a low value for the backlight.
- 5. Select ok.

Changing the Keypad Backlight Settings

To change the keypad backlight settings in order to conserve more battery power:

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Keylight icon > Battery Power tab.
- 2. Select the **On battery power: Disable keylight if device if not used for** check box and select a value from the drop-down list.
- 3. Select the Advanced tab.
- 4. Tap the **Disable keylight** check box to turn off the keypad backlight.
- 5. Select ok.

Turning Off the Radios

Windows Mobile 6 devices include **Wireless Manager**, which provides a simple method of enabling, disabling, and configuring all the device's wireless capabilities in one place.

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To open Wireless Manager, tap the Connectivity icon or tap Wireless Manager on the Today screen.

Chapter 3 Using the MC9500-K

Introduction

This chapter explains the indicators, buttons, status icons, and controls on the MC9500-K, and provides basic instructions for using the device.

LED Indicators

The MC9500-K has three LED indicators. The Decode LED indicates scanning status. The Battery Status LED indicates battery charging and health status. The WAN Radio Status LED indicates WAN radio status. *Table 3-1* describes the LED indications.




Figure 3-1 LED Indicators

Resetting the MC9500-K

There are two reset functions, warm boot and cold boot. A warm boot restarts the MC9500-K by closing all running programs. A cold boot also restarts the MC9500-K, and also initializes some drivers. Data saved in flash memory or a memory card is not lost.

If the MC9500-K is not functioning properly, perform a warm boot first. If the MC9500-K still does not respond, perform a cold boot.

Performing a Warm Boot

Hold down the red **Power** button for approximately five seconds. As soon as the MC9500-K starts to boot release the **Power** button.

Performing a Cold Boot

To perform a cold boot, simultaneously press the red **Power** button and the 1 and 9 keys.

Waking the MC9500-K

The wake-up conditions define what actions wake up the mobile computer after it has gone into suspend mode. The mobile computer can go into suspend mode by either pressing the Power button or automatically by Control Panel time-out settings. These settings are configurable and the factory default settings are shown in *Table 3-2* are subject to change/update.Tap **Start > Setting > System > Power** icon > **Wakeup** tab to configure these settings.

Locking the MC9500-K

You can lock the MC9500-K by disabling key presses and screen tap or by requiring a password.

Keypad Locking

Locking the MC9500-K turns off keyboard and touch screen functionality. This is helpful when the MC9500-K is turned on and you want to prevent accidental key presses.

To lock the device, tap the Device unlocked icon. The icon changes to locked.




Figure 3-3 Device Locked/Unlocked Icons

To unlock the device and free it for use, tap Unlock.

Password Locking

Use the **Password** window to set a password to disable unauthorized access to the MC9500-K.



NOTE If the device is configured to connect to a network, use a strong (difficult to figure out) password to help protect network security. Password cracking tools continue to improve and the computers used to crack passwords are more powerful than ever.

- 2. Select **Prompt if device unused for** check box to enable password protection.
- 3. From the drop-down list, select a time value for the protection to take affect after non-use.
- 4. From the Password type: drop-down list, select either Simple PIN or Strong alphanumeric.
- 5. For a simple password, enter a four-digit password in the **Password** field.

For a stronger password:

- a. Enter a seven character password in the **Password:** field. A strong password must contain at least seven characters and contain at least three of the following: uppercase and lowercase letters, numerals, and punctuation.
- b. Re-enter the password in the **Confirm:** field.
- 6. Tap ok.
- 7. To set a hint to remember the password, tap the **Hint** tab.




Figure 3-7 Enter Password Windows

Keypads

The MC9500-K offers four types modular keypad configurations. See *Appendix C, Keypads* for keypad functionality.

Function Buttons

The MC9500-K's buttons perform certain functions.

- **Power**: Press the red **Power** button to place the MC9500-K into suspend mode or wake from suspend mode. Also use the **Power** button to reset the MC9500-K by performing a warm or cold boot. See *Resetting the* MC9500-K on page 3-3.
- Scan/Action: Press to scan bar codes or capture images. See Chapter 4, Data Capture.
 Or, press to open an application or perform a function. See the Microsoft[®] Applications for Mobile 6 User Guide to set an application to open.
- Volume Up/Down: Press to increase or decrease the MC9500-K's volume.
- Action: Press to open an application or perform a function. See the *Microsoft[®] Applications for Windows Mobile 6 User Guide* to set an application to open.
- Green Key: Press to open the Phone Dialer window or answer an incoming call or place a call on hold.
- Red Key: Press to end a call.
- Function Keys: Programmable functions for performing specific applications.
 - F1 Left soft key
 - F2 Right soft key
 - F3 Talk (MC9596/8 only)
 - F4 End Call (MC9596/8 only)
 - F5 Refreshes the screen in Internet Explorer and File Explorer.
 - F6 Volume Up.

Stylus

Use the MC9500-K stylus to select items and enter information. The stylus functions as a mouse.

- Tap: Touch the screen once with the stylus to press option buttons and open menu items.
- Tap and Hold: Tap and hold the stylus on an item to see a list of actions available for that item. On the pop-up menu that appears, tap the action to perform.
- Drag: Hold the stylus on the screen and drag across the screen to select text and images. Drag in a list to select multiple items.



CAUTION To prevent damage to the screen, do not use any device other than the Motorola-provided stylus.

Entering Data




Figure 3-8 Entering Data on the Keypad

When entering data on the keypad, use either the single-hand method or the two-hand method as shown in *Figure 3-8*.

Interactive Sensor Technology

This section describes the functionality of the Interactive Sensor Technology (IST) feature on the MC9500-K.

The IST supports the following features.

- Power Management manage power by configuring IST to control switching on/off the backlight, control suspend mode of the MC9500-K by monitoring motion and orientation.
- Display Orientation switch the screen orientation to either landscape or portrait depending on the MC9500-K orientation.
- Free Fall Detection monitors free fall duration and records the time and type of the drop event.

Power Management

The MC9500-K orientation and motion sensitive data can be used as an indicator of MC9500-K usage and can be used to manage the battery power of the mobile computer. For example, IST can be configured to control the backlight on and off functionality or go into suspend according to a user gesture by placing screen facing down. It can also be used to keep the MC9500-K active while it is in movement to prevent it from quickly going into suspend mode while in use.

Display Orientation

The screen can be rotated between portrait and landscape modes automatically, depending on the physical orientation of the MC9500-K. For example, if the MC9500-K is rotated 90° counterclockwise, IST rotates the display counterclockwise 90° so that the screen display appears correct.

This functionality is achieved by monitoring screen angle and rotating the display to counter any changes. IST only rotates the screen in multiples of 90°.




Figure 3-9 Display Orientation

Free Fall Detection

IST continuously monitors gravitational force on the MC9500-K according to its current position. When the MC9500-K free falls, IST detects the absence of gravitational force and records the event data if it detects a free fall more than 450 ms, which may indicates nearly a one meter drop. This data can be used as an indicator of potential abuse or misuse.

IST features a log for recording the free fall events. This log records the date, time and the time period of the free fall.






Figure 3-10 Free Fall Detection

Today Screen

The Today screen displays important information, such as upcoming appointments and status indicators. Tap a section on the screen to open the associated program. Alternatively, tap **Start** > **Today** to display the **Today** screen.





To customize the **Today** screen, tap **Start** > **Settings** > **Today** icon. Use the **Appearance** tab to customize the background and the **Items** tab to change the list and order of items that appear on the screen.




Figure 3-13 Battery Status Dialog Box

Battery Reserve Options

If the charge of the battery reaches a critical threshold, the MC9500-K shuts down. This threshold can be changed but affects the amount of time that data can be retained.

1. Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Power icon > RunTime tab. A warning message appears.

- 3. Select one of the Battery Reserve Options.
 - **Option 1: Minimum** After a low battery shutdown, data will be retained for minimum amount of time. Battery should be replaced immediately to avoid data loss.
 - Option 2: Less After a low battery shutdown, data will be retained for less than normal amount of time.
 - Option 3: Normal After a low battery shutdown, data will be retained for maximum amount of time.
- 4. Tap ok.

Main Battery Temperature Notifications

The temperature notification system implements three levels of notification when the temperature within the battery exceeds specific temperature thresholds:

- Level 1: Temperature Watch; this level is similar to main battery low warning. It indicates that the battery temperature has reached the first threshold level. The user should move to an environment within proper operating temperature.
- Level 2: Temperature Warning; this level is similar to main battery very low warning. It indicates the battery temperature has reached the second threshold level. The user should stop using the MC9500-K.

• Level 3: Temperature Error; this level indicates the battery has reached an unusable temperature threshold and immediately suspends the MC9500-K. This level does not have any graphical notification associated with it.

Using Voice-Over-IP

The MC9500-K supports Voice over IP over WLAN (VoWLAN) using Motorola or third party voice clients. The MC9500-K can communicate using VoIP either using the MC9500-K supports several audio outputs, including back speaker phone, front receiver or handset, and Bluetooth headset.

It is recommended that the wireless network use the 802.11a (5 GHz) band for voice applications. Using the 5 GHz band avoids some noise sources that may occur on the 802.11b/g (2.4 GHz) band due to wireless interference.

When using a Bluetooth headset with the MC9500-K and VoWLAN, it is required to use the Bluetooth Headset profile instead of Hands-free profile. Use the buttons on the MC9500-K to answer and end calls. See Chapter 7, Using Bluetooth for information on setting up a Bluetooth Headset Profile.

Infrared Connection

Using infrared, you can enable short-range file exchange between your MC9500-K and another IrDA device.

Exchanging Files using IR Connection

Ensure that the IrDA function on both the MC9500-K and the other device are enabled.

To send files via IrDA connection:

1. Switch to the program where you created the item you want to send and locate the item in the list.

NOTE Do not cover or block the IrDA window.

2. Align the IrDA port of the MC9500-K with that of the IrDA device so that they are unobstructed and within a close range.




Figure 3-20 Align MC9500-K with IrDA Device

Chapter 4 Data Capture

Introduction

The MC9500-K offers three types of data capture options:

- Laser scanning
- Imaging
- Color digital camera.



NOTE To read a bar code, a scanning enabled application must be installed on the MC9500-K. A sample scanning application can be downloaded from the Motorola Support Central site at http://www.motorola.com/enterprisemobility/support.

Laser Scanning

An MC9500-K with an integrated linear laser scanner has the following features:

- Reading of a variety of bar code symbologies, including the most popular 1-D code types.
- Intuitive aiming for easy point-and-shoot operation.

Scanning Considerations

Typically, scanning is a simple matter of aim, scan, and decode and a few quick trial efforts master it. However, consider the following to optimize scanning performance:

• Range

Any scanning device decodes well over a particular working range — minimum and maximum distances from the bar code. This range varies according to bar code density and scanning device optics.

Scanning within range brings quick and dependable decodes; scanning too close or too far away prevents decodes. Move the scanner closer or further away to find the right working range for the bar codes being scanned.

Angle

Scanning angle is important for promoting quick decodes.

The MC9500-K scans at a 15° angle which improves scanning ergonomics.

- Hold the MC9500-K farther away for larger symbols.
- Move the MC9500-K closer for symbols with bars that are close together.



NOTE Scanning procedures depend on the application and MC9500-K configuration. An application may use different scanning procedures from the one listed above.

Laser Scanning

1. Ensure that a scan enabled application is loaded on the MC9500-K.




Figure 4-1 Linear Scanning

 Press and hold the scan button. The laser beam exits from the end of the MC9500-K. Ensure the red scan beam covers the entire bar code. The Decode LED lights red to indicate that scanning is in process, then lights green and a beep sounds, by default, to indicate the bar code was decoded successfully.




Figure 4-2 Linear Scanner Aiming Pattern



Imaging

MC9500-K with an integrated imager have the following features:

- Omnidirectional (360°) reading of a variety of bar code symbologies, including the most popular linear, postal, PDF417, and 2D matrix code types.
- The ability to capture and download images to a host for a variety of imaging applications.
- Advanced intuitive laser aiming for easy point-and-shoot operation.

The imager uses digital camera technology to take a digital picture of a bar code, stores the resulting image in its memory, and executes state-of-the-art software decoding algorithms to extract the data from the image.

Operational Modes

MC9500-K with an integrated imager support three modes of operation, listed below. Activate each mode pressing the **Scan** button.

• **Decode Mode**: In this mode, the MC9500-K attempts to locate and decode enabled bar codes within its field of view. The imager remains in this mode as long as you hold the scan button, or until it decodes a bar code.



NOTE To enable Pick List Mode, download the Control Panel applet from the Support Central web site at http://www.motorola.com/enterprisemobility/support. Pick List can also be set in an application using a API command.

- Pick List Mode: This mode allows you to selectively decode a bar code when more than one bar code is in the MC9500-K's field of view. To accomplish this, move the aiming crosshair center dot over the required bar code to decode only that bar code. This feature is ideal for pick lists containing multiple bar codes and manufacturing or transport labels containing more than one bar code type (either 1D or 2D).
- **Image Capture Mode**: Use this mode to capture an image within the MC9500-K's field of view. This is useful for capturing signatures or images of items like damaged boxes.

Imager Scanning

1. Ensure that a scan-enabled application is loaded on the MC9500-K.




Figure 4-5 Image Capture Field of View

2. Press and hold the scan button.

The red laser aiming pattern turns on to assist in aiming. Ensure the cross-hair is on top of the bar code.

The Decode LED lights red to indicate that scanning is in process, then lights green and a beep sounds, by default, to indicate the bar code was decoded successfully. Note that when the MC9500-K is in Pick List Mode, the imager does not decode the bar code until the crosshair center dot touches the bar code.






Figure 4-7 Pick List Mode with Multiple Bar Codes


3. Release the scan button.



NOTE Imager decoding usually occurs instantaneously. The MC9500-K repeats the steps required to take a digital picture (image) of a poor or difficult bar code as long as the scan button remains pressed.

Imager Decode Ranges

The decode ranges provide the decode distances for bar codes of specified densities. *Figure 4-8* shows the imager decode ranges and *Table 4-2 on page 4-9* lists the scan ranges for the selected bar code densities. The minimum element width (or "symbol density") is the width in mils of the narrowest element (bar or space) in the symbol. The maximum usable length of a symbol at any given range is shown below.

- Photo capture
- Video capture
- ٠ Omnidirectional reading of a variety of bar code symbologies, including the most popular linear, postal, PDF417, and 2D matrix code types.
- Advanced intuitive aiming for easy point-and-shoot operation.

Digital Camera Scanning

The camera uses digital camera technology to take a digital picture of a bar code, stores the resulting image in its memory, and executes state-of-the-art software decoding algorithms to extract the data from the image.

1. Ensure that a scan-enabled application is loaded on the MC9500-K.

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- 2. Aim the camera lens on the back of the MC9500-K at a bar code.
- 3. Press and hold the scan button. A preview window appears on the display window with a red aiming reticle in the center. The Decode LED lights red to indicate that scanning is in process.

- 4. Move the MC9500-K until the red aiming reticle is over the bar code to scan.
- 5. The Decode LED lights green and a beep sounds, by default, to indicate the bar code was decoded successfully.



NOTE The camera decode feature is set by default to automatically decode the bar code when read. This feature can be programmed to display a green aiming reticle upon good decode indicating that the bar code has been successfully decoded and to that the scan button may be released.

Taking Photos

NOTE Ensure that the scanning/imaging application is disabled prior to enabling the camera.

To take a photo:

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Pictures & Videos icon.
- 2. Tap Camera on the command bar.
- 3. Check the image on the view finder, adjust if necessary.
- 4. Press the Enter key to take the picture. Hold the MC9500-K still until the shutter sound is heard.

Recording Video



NOTE Ensure that the scanning/imaging application is disabled prior to enabling the camera.

To record a video clip:

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Pictures & Videos icon.
- 2. Tap Camera on the command bar.
- 3. Tap Menu > Video to set shooting mode to video.

The available recording time displays on the screen.

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NOTE By default, the time limit for recording videos is set to 30 seconds.

Press the Enter key to begin recording.
 Recording stops when you press the Enter button again.

Viewing Photos and Videos

To view photos and video clips:

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Pictures & Videos icon.
- 2. Tap the picture or video clip to view.

Chapter 5 Using the Phone

Introduction

Use the MC9596 and MC9598 to make phone calls, set up speed dials, keep track of calls, and send text messages. Your wireless service provider may also provide other services such as voice mail, call forwarding, and caller ID.

Also use the integrated phone to connect to an ISP or work network in order to browse the Web and read e-mail. Connect to the Internet or work network over High-Speed Downlink Packet Access (HSDPA) (MC9596) or Evolution Data-Optimized (EvDO) (MC9598) using Cellular Line, or using the modem specified by the mobile operator. For more information, or to customize the MC9500-K phone by changing phone settings, see the *MC9500-K Mobile Computer Integrator Guide*.

Accessing the Phone Keypad

NOTE Keypads vary depending on services and the state of the phone.

Access the keypad regardless of the program in use. Applications on the MC9500-K can be in use during a call.

To access the phone keypad tap Start > Phone, press the F1 key or press the green key.

To receive calls when the MC9500-K is suspended, leave the phone radio turned on and ensure the MC9500-K is set to wake with any key.

Turning the Phone On and Off

Windows Mobile 6.1 devices include **Wireless Manager**, which provides a simple method of enabling and disabling the phone.

To toggle on or off the phone, tap Phone bar.

To configure settings for a connection, tap **Menu > Phone Settings**.

NOTE To receive calls when your device is suspended, leave the phone turned on.

Audio Modes

The MC9500-K offers three audio modes for use during phone calls:

- Handset Mode: Switches audio to the speaker at the top front of the MC9500-K, so you can use the MC9500-K as a handset. This is the default mode.
- Speaker Mode: Use the MC9500-K as if on speaker phone. Tap the Speaker On button to activate this mode. Tap the Speaker Off button to switch back to handset mode.
- Headset Mode: Connect a Bluetooth headset or a wired headset to automatically switch audio to the headset.

The MC9500-K defaults to handset mode. When a wired headset is plugged into the MC9500-K headset connector or a Bluetooth headset is configured for use with the MC9500-K, the earpiece and speakerphone are muted and audio is heard through the headset.

NOTE While using a Bluetooth headset during a call, the mobile computer will not go into suspend mode.


Figure 5-3 Audio Modes

Handset Mode

Using a Wired Headset

NOTE Remove the headset jack plug before connecting the Headset Adapter to the MC9500-K.

You can use a stereo headset for audio communication when using an audio-enabled application. To use a headset, plug the headset jack of the Headset Adapter Cable into the headset connector on the side of the MC9500-K. Plug the Headset connector into the connector on the Headset Adapter Cable. Set the MC9500-K's volume appropriately before putting the headset on. Plugging a headset into the jack mutes the speaker.





Using a Bluetooth Headset

You can use a Bluetooth headset for audio communication when using an audio-enabled application. See Chapter 7, Using Bluetooth for information on connecting a Bluetooth headset to the MC9500-K. Set the MC9500-K's volume appropriately before putting the headset on. When a Bluetooth headset is connected the speakerphone is muted.

It is recommended for phone conversations to use the Bluetooth Hands-free profile instead of the Headset profile. See Chapter 7, Using Bluetooth for more information.

NOTE When using a Bluetooth headset, during a call, the MC9500-K power button is disabled and the MC9500-K will not go into suspend mode. Once the call is completed, the power button functionality is enabled.

The following dialog box displays when a Bluetooth headset connection is established and the power button is pressed.

Adjusting Audio Volume

Use the Volume Control Slider or the keypad keys to adjust the volume of the ringer when not in a call and the audio volume when in a call.




Figure 5-6 Phone Volume Slider

To adjust the volume tap the **Speaker** icon in the **Title** bar. Move the slider up or down to adjust the volume.



NOTE Adjust the conversation phone volume during a call. Adjusting the volume while not in a call affects the ring and notification sound levels.

Hearing Aid Compatibility Setting

To set the Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) setting:

Tap Start > Settings> System > HAC Settings icon. The HAC Settings window appears.




Figure 5-7 HAC Settings Window

To enable the HAC feature, tap the **Enable HAC** radio button.

To disable the HAC feature, tap the **Disable HAC** radio button.

Making a Call

NOTE You can make emergency calls even when the MC9500-K is locked or when a SIM card is not installed. See *Making an Emergency Call on page 5-9* for more information.

With the MC9500-K, you can make a call from the phone, contacts, speed dial and call history.

Using the Phone

To make a call using the phone keypad:

- 1. Tap Start > Phone or press the green key.
- 2. From the Phone keypad, tap the number to call.
- 3. Tap Talk.
- 4. Tap End to stop dialing or end the call.



NOTE Alternatively, use the green and red keys on the MC9500-K function key to dial (green) and end (red) calls.

If you tap a wrong number, tap Delete key to erase each subsequent digit of a number. To erase the entire number, tap and hold the Delete key.

Using Contacts

Use Contacts to make a call without looking up or entering the phone number.

To make a call from Contacts:

- 1. Tap Start > Contacts.
- 2. From the contact list, tap and hold the contact name.

3. Tap Call Work, Call Home or Call Mobile.

NOTE To make a call from an open contact, tap the number to call. See On-Device Help for more information about Contacts.

Creating an Outlook Contact

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NOTE When entering a contact phone number that contains a star (*) character followed by a plus (+) character, save the contact as an Outlook Contact. Do not save the contact to a SIM card.

To create an Outlook contact:

- 1. Tap Start > Contacts.
- 2. Tap New.
- 3. If the Phone is on the Select Contact Type window displays. Select Outlook Contact.

From the Phone keypad, tap **Speed Dial** and tap the speed dial location number of the desired contact in the list.

Making an Emergency Call

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 999, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted. Your service provider can program additional emergency numbers into your SIM card. However, your SIM card must be inserted in your phone in order to use the numbers stored on it. See your service provider for additional information.

When the alpha primary keypad is locked, press the Orange key twice to set the keypad to numeric mode and then enter the emergency number.



NOTE Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

Answering a Call

A dialog box appears on the MC9500-K when it receives an incoming call. If the phone is set to ring, a ring tone sounds. Answer or ignore the incoming call.

To answer an incoming call tap **Answer** on the **Phone** > **Incoming...** dialog or press the green key.

To ignore the incoming call tap **Ignore**. This may send the caller to voice mail, depending on the service provider. Otherwise, this presents **Busy** to the calling party.

To end the call tap End or press the red key.

Incoming Call Features

- If you receive a call while in a call, tap Wait to place the call in call waiting.
- You can use other programs on the MC9500-K during a call. To switch back to Phone, tap Talk or tap Start > Phone. Tap End to end the call.
- If a caller isn't in your contact list, create a contact during the call or from Call History by tapping Menu > Save to Contacts.
- To terminate a call when a second call comes in and answer the waiting call, tap **End** on the Phone keypad to disconnect the active call, then tap **Answer** or press the **Send** key to answer the waiting call.
- To hold the current call and answer a waiting call, tap Answer or press the Send key to place the current call on hold and answer the incoming call.
- To put a call on hold to call another number or answer an incoming call, tap Hold. To move from one call to another, tap Swap.

Smart Dialing

Smart Dialing makes it easy to dial a phone number. When you start entering numbers or characters, Smart Dialing automatically searches and sorts the contact entries on the SIM card, in Contacts, and the phone numbers in Call History (including incoming, outgoing, and missed calls). You can then select the desired number or contact from the filtered list to dial.

Open the Phone screen, then tap the keys on the Phone keypad that correspond to the phone number or contact to call. The contact panel lists contacts that match the sequence that you entered.

Smart Dialing starts looking for numbers or contacts that match the sequence entered.

To find a phone number:

- Enter the first one or two digits to find a phone number in Call History.
- Enter the first three digits or more to find a phone number from the saved Contacts and SIM card.

To find a contact name:

- Enter the first letter of a contact's first name or last name. Smart Dialing searches for the letter starting from the first character of a contact name as well as from the character that appears after a space, dash, or underscore in a contact name. For example, if you tap number "2" which is associated with [a, b, c] on the Phone keypad, contact names such as the following will be considered matches: "Smith, Bernard", "Adams, John", "Carlson, Eileen", "Dillon, Albert", "Childs, Larry", "Cooper, Robert" and "Parks, Celine".
- If the matching list is long narrow down the search further by entering another letter. Using the same example above, tap "3" which is associated with (d, e, f), the matching list is narrowed down to the following names: "Smith, Bernard", "Adams, John", and "Parks, Celine".

To make a call or send a text message using Smart Dialing:

- 1. Begin entering the first few numbers or characters.
- 2. In the Smart Dialing panel, use the up and down arrows on the keypad to navigate to the desired contact or phone number.
- 3. When the correct contact is selected, press TALK to make a voice call.
- 4. To send a text message to the selected contact, tap Menu > Send Text Message.
- 5. To call a different phone number associated with the selected contact, tap the contact name and select the phone number to call.

Muting a Call

During a call, you can mute the microphone so you can hear the person on the line but he or she cannot hear conversation from the microphone. This is useful when there is conversation or background noise on your end.

To mute or unmute a call:

- 1. Tap Start > Phone or press the green key.
- 2. Make a call.
- 3. Tap Mute on the display to mute the audio. The Mute icon appears.

Taking Notes

To create a note during a call, tap **Note** on the display, then enter the note. For more information about creating notes see the Windows On-Device Help.

To access a note created during a call:

- 1. Tap **Start > Phone** or press the green key.
- 2. From the Phone keypad, tap Call History.
- 3. Tap and hold the number or the Note icon for the phone call entry containing the note.

Using Call History

Use Call History to call someone who was recently called, or recently called in. Call History provides the time and duration of all incoming, outgoing, and missed calls. It also provides a summary of total calls and easy access to notes taken during a call. Table 4-1 lists the call history icons that appear in the **Call History** window.




Figure 5-24 Call History - Tools Menu




Figure 5-33 Creating a Conference Call

Text Messaging

Short text messages delivered over mobile networks transmit from the sending MC9500-K, are stored in a central short message center, then forwarded to the destination mobile device. If the recipient is not available, the message is stored and can be sent later.

Viewing Text Messages

To view a text message:

You can view a text message whether the phone is on or off. When the phone is on, you can view a text message from its notification callout. Tap the **text message notification** icon on the navigation bar to display the message.


Figure 5-38 Text Messaging on Today Screen




Figure 5-42 Create Text Message




Figure 5-46 Connecting Using GPRS

13. If the SIM card is protected with a Personal Identification Number (PIN), a dialog box pops up requesting the appropriate PIN to unlock the SIM card. In this case, enter the PIN and tap **ok**.



NOTE Place emergency calls at any time, without entering a PIN or a SIM card.

14. When a connection is established, launch **Internet Explorer** to browse the Internet or launch an applicable application.

Ending a Data Connection

To cancel a data connection in progress, tap Cancel in the Connecting... dialog window.

To end an established data connection:

1. Tap H, G or E to display the **Connectivity** dialog box.

Establishing an MC9598 Data Connection



NOTE Ensure that you have data service activated with your service provider.

A data connection allows Internet access across a wireless network. Data connection is pre-packaged with service accounts.

To verify active data service:

- 1. Tap Start > Internet Explorer.
- 2. In the address bar, enter a URL for a web site.
- **3.** Tap **E** to display the **Connectivity** dialog. The dialog box displays the data connection information.



Chapter 6 Using GPS Navigation

Introduction

The MC9500-K includes Global Positioning System (GPS) technology using the SiRFstar III chipset. GPS technology is based on a worldwide system of GPS satellites orbiting the earth that continuously transmit digital radio signals. These radio signals contain data on the satellites' locations and their exact clock time and are used to determine your location on the earth.



WARNING! When using the MC9500-K in a vehicle, it is the user's responsibility to place, secure and use in a manner that will not cause accidents, personal injury or property damage or obstruct their view. It is the responsibility of the driver to operate the vehicle in a safe manner, maintain observation of all driving conditions at all times, and not become distracted by the device to the exclusion of safe driving practices. It is unsafe to operate the controls of the device while driving.

Software Installation

Third-party GPS navigation software is required. Evaluation software is available from various suppliers. For example; VisualGPS, visit: http://www.visualgps.net/VisualGPSce/

If interested in purchasing GPS navigation software check with the GPS software vendor (before purchasing, downloading, or installing any software) to determine that the application is compatible with the MC9500-K. Refer to the application's user guide for application installation and setup information.

MC9500-K GPS Setup

The GPS-enabled MC9500-K uses Microsoft Windows Mobile 6, so the operating system automatically manages access to the GPS receiver to allow multiple programs to simultaneously access GPS data.

Ensure that the following settings are set on the MC9500-K:

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > System > External GPS icon.
- 2. In the **Programs** tab, ensure that the **GPS program port** drop-down list is set to **None**.
- 3. In the Hardware tab, ensure that the GPS hardware port drop-down list is set to COM8.

- 4. Ensure that the Baud rate drop-down list is set to 57600.
- 5. Tap ok to close the Setting window.

Operation

Acquiring satellite signals may take several seconds to a few minutes. It is best to be outside and have a clear, unobstructed view of the sky. Without a clear view, acquisition takes much longer and could result in the MC9500-K being unable to compute the initial position quickly. When operating the device indoors access to the GPS signals may be limited or unavailable.



NOTE When using a GPS navigation application, ensure that the MC9500-K does not go into suspend mode. If the MC9500-K suspends then the power to the GPS radio is removed. Upon resume the GPS receiver must reacquire a valid GPS signal, resulting in a a delay of positional information.

GPS Maps on microSD Cards

GPS navigation software vendors may sell maps on microSD cards. If using a microSD card with the GPS navigation software install the microSD memory card using procedure in *Installing a microSD Card on page 1-3*.

Answering a Phone Call While Using GPS

If you receive a phone call while using your GPS navigation software:

- 1. Answer the phone call by pressing the **Answer** button.
- 2. Once you end the phone call, press the End Call button to resume the audio on the GPS software.



NOTE Anytime you are using GPS on the MC9500-K and you receive a phone call, the audio on the GPS navigation software is muted until you finish the call.

Losing the GPS Signal While in a Vehicle

GPS performance on the MC9500-K may be affected if the vehicle has thermal glass windows and windshields, which can block the MC9500-K from receiving a GPS signal from satellites. To improve GPS signal strength, place the MC9500-K where there is a clear view of the sky. A direct line of sight is required between the MC9500-K and the GPS satellites to access information from the satellites.

The Global Positioning System (GPS) is a system that allows the user to track their position anywhere on the earth.

Assisted GPS

GPS can be used in stand-alone or Assisted GPS (A-GPS) modes. A Stand-alone GPS receiver downloads data from GPS satellites. In certain environments, it can take several minutes to get a fix. By using GPS Location servers, A-GPS dramatically reduces the TTFF (Time To First Fix) and improves the sensitivity of GPS receivers by providing them with data that they would ordinarily have to download from the GPS satellites. With the A-GPS data, GPS receivers can operate faster and more reliably.

NOTE User can select COM port from the GPS program port drop-down list. If an application error message appears indicating that the COM port cannot be opened, ensure that a free COM port is selected.

A-GPS follows the Secure User Plane Location (SUPL) protocol which allows a mobile device to communicate with a SUPL server. Refer to the EMDK Help file for information on setting up SUPL on the MC9500-K.

Chapter 7 Using Bluetooth

Introduction

Bluetooth-equipped devices can communicate without wires, using frequency-hopping spread spectrum (FHSS) radio frequency (RF) to transmit and receive data in the 2.4 GHz Industry Scientific and Medical (ISM) band (802.15.1). Bluetooth wireless technology is specifically designed for short-range (30 feet/10 meters) communication and low power consumption.

MC9500-Ks with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information (e.g., files, appointments, and tasks) with other Bluetooth enabled devices such as phones, printers, access points, and other mobile computers. To use the MC9500-K as a modem, create a dial-up modem connection between a computer and MC9500-K.

The MC9500-K with Bluetooth technology uses either the StoneStreet Bluetooth stack or the Microsoft Bluetooth stack. To write an application that uses the StoneStreet One Bluetooth stack APIs, refer to the Enterprise Mobility Developer Kit (EMDK) Help.

Adaptive Frequency Hopping

Adaptive Frequency Hopping (AFH) is a method of avoiding fixed frequency interferers, and can be used with Bluetooth voice. All devices in the piconet (Bluetooth network) must be AFH-capable in order for AFH to work. There is no AFH when connecting and discovering devices. Avoid making Bluetooth connections and discoveries during critical 802.11b communications. AFH for Bluetooth consists of four main sections:

- Channel Classification A method of detecting an interference on a channel-by-channel basis, or pre-defined channel mask.
- Link Management Coordinates and distributes the AFH information to the rest of the Bluetooth network.
- Hop Sequence Modification Avoids interference by selectively reducing the number of hopping channels.
- Channel Maintenance A method for periodically re-evaluating the channels.

When AFH is enabled, the Bluetooth radio "hops around" (instead of through) the 802.11b high-rate channels. AFH coexistence allows Motorola mobile computers to operate in any infrastructure.

The Bluetooth radio in this MC9500-K operates as a Class 2 device power class. The maximum output power is 2.5mW and the expected range is 32.8 feet (10 meters). A definition of ranges based on power class is difficult to obtain due to power and device differences, and whether one measures open space or closed office space.



NOTE It is not recommended to perform Bluetooth wireless technology inquiry when high rate 802.11b operation is required.

Security

The current Bluetooth specification defines security at the link level. Application-level security is not specified. This allows application developers to define security mechanisms tailored to their specific need. Link-level security occurs between devices, not users, while application-level security can be implemented on a per-user basis. The Bluetooth specification defines security algorithms and procedures needed to authenticate devices, and if needed, encrypt the data flowing on the link between the devices. Device authentication is a mandatory feature of Bluetooth while link encryption is optional.

Pairing of Bluetooth devices is accomplished by creating an initialization key that is used to authenticate the devices and create a link key for them. Entering a common PIN number in the devices being paired generates the initialization key. The PIN number is never sent over the air. By default, the Bluetooth stack responds with no key when a key is requested (it is up to user to respond to the key request event). Authentication of Bluetooth devices is based-upon a challenge-response transaction. Bluetooth allows for a PIN number or passkey that is used to create other 128-bit keys used for security and encryption. The encryption key is derived from the link key used to authenticate the pairing devices. Also worthy of note is the limited range and fast frequency hopping of the Bluetooth radios that makes long-distance eavesdropping difficult.

Recommendations are:

- Perform pairing in a secure environment
- Keep PIN codes private and don't store the PIN codes in the mobile computer
- Implement application-level security.

The Microsoft stack supports Smart-pairing. For detailed information, refer to the Microsoft MSDN.

Bluetooth Configuration

By default, the MC9500-K is configured to using the StoneStreet One Bluetooth stack. Refer to the *MC9500-K Mobile Computer Integrator Guide*, Appendix B, for information on switching to the Microsoft Bluetooth stack.

If the MC9500-K is configured to use the StoneStreet One Bluetooth stack, the Bluetooth icon appears at the bottom right corner of the Today screen. If the Microsoft Bluetooth stack is configured, the Bluetooth icon does not appear.

Bluetooth Power States

Cold Boot

With StoneStreet One Bluetooth Stack

Performing a cold boot on the MC9500-K turns off Bluetooth after initialization (which takes a few moments). It is normal to see the **Bluetooth** icon appear and disappear, as well as a wait cursor, when initialization proceeds in all modes.

With Microsoft Bluetooth Stack

Performing a cold boot retain the state of the Bluetooth radio prior to the cold boot.

Warm Boot

With StoneStreet One Bluetooth Stack

Performing a warm boot on the MC9500-K turns off Bluetooth.

With Microsoft Bluetooth Stack

Performing a warm boot retain the state of the Bluetooth radio prior to the warm boot.

Suspend

When there is an active Bluetooth connection, the Bluetooth radio goes into low power mode maintaining the active connection. When there is no active connection, the Bluetooth radio turns off.

With StoneStreet One Bluetooth Stack



NOTE If there is an active Bluetooth connection between the MC9500-K and another Bluetooth device, the MC9500-K will not timeout. However, if the user presses the Power button on the MC9500-K, the MC9500-K will suspend (except when on a call) and upon receiving data from a remote Bluetooth device, the MC9500-K will wake from suspend mode. For example, headset redial or Bluetooth scanner sending data to the MC9500-K.

With Microsoft Bluetooth Stack

NOTE If there is an active Bluetooth connection between the MC9500-K and another Bluetooth device and there is no data activity, the MC9500-K will timeout. However, if the user presses the Power button on the MC9500-K, the MC9500-K will suspend (except when on a call) and upon receiving data from a remote Bluetooth device, the MC9500-K will wake from suspend mode. For example, headset redial or Bluetooth scanner sending data to the MC9500-K.

Resume

When the MC9500-K resumes, Bluetooth turns on if it was on prior to suspend.

Using Microsoft Bluetooth Stack

The following sections provide information on using the Microsoft Bluetooth stack.

Turning the Bluetooth Radio Mode On and Off

Turn off the Bluetooth radio to save power or if entering an area with radio restrictions (e.g., an airplane). When the radio is off, other Bluetooth devices cannot see or connect to the MC9500-K. Turn on the Bluetooth radio to exchange information with other Bluetooth devices (within range). Communicate only with Bluetooth radios in close proximity.



NOTE To achieve the best battery life turn off radios not in use.

Enabling Bluetooth

To enable Bluetooth:

1. Tap Wireless Manager and then tap the Bluetooth bar or

Discovering Bluetooth Device(s)

The MC9500-K can receive information from discovered devices without bonding. However, once bonded, the MC9500-K and a bonded device exchange information automatically when you turn the Bluetooth radio on. See *Bonding with Discovered Device(s) on page 7-34* for more information.

To find Bluetooth devices in the area:

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the Bluetooth device to discover is in discoverable and connectable modes.
- 3. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 4. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Bluetooth icon > Devices tab.

You are prompted to enter a passcode. If the device has a specific passcode, enter it in the Passcode field and tap **Next**. If the device does not have a specific passcode, enter a passcode in the Passcode field and tap **Next**. The Bluetooth radio tries to connect with the device.

- 9. If you created a passcode, you will be prompted by the other device to enter the same passcode. Enter the created passcode to establish a paired connection. (If you entered a passcode from the device, you shouldn't have to do anything on the other device.)
- 10. When the connection is complete, a list of matching and supported services on the device appears.
- 11. Select the services you want to use and tap Finish. The services on the new devices have to be selected or else the pairing won't include those services, even though the devices are paired. If services are not selected, you will be continually reprompted for the passcode from the device.
- 12. The device appears in the list on the main window.

After the passcodes have been accepted on both sides, you have a trusted ("paired") connection.

NOTE Some devices might not require a PIN. This depends upon the device's authentication.

Object Push Services via Beam

NOTE You can only send files to a remote device using the Beam function.

Use the OBEX Push Service to send files and contacts to another Bluetooth device. To transfer files between the MC9500-K and another Bluetooth enabled device:

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled and discoverable on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.

3. Tap Start > Programs > File Explorer.

- 4. Navigate to the file to transfer.
- 5. Tap and hold on the filename until the pop-up menu appears.

To transfer a contact between the MC9500-K and another Bluetooth enabled device:

1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled and discoverable on both devices.

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- 2. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 3. Tap Start > Contacts
- 4. Navigate to the contact to transfer.
- 5. Tap and hold on the contact until the pop-up menu appears.




Figure 7-10 Contact Window

Internet Sharing

Internet Sharing allows the user to connect a computer or laptop to the MC9500-K and use the MC9500-K as a modem to connect to an office network or ISP.

To use MC9500-K as a modem using Bluetooth:

- 1. Ensure that the device is not connected to the computer or laptop.
- 2. On the MC9500-K, ensure that the Phone is on and a data connection is configured.
- 3. Tap > Programs > Internet Sharing.
- 4. In the PC Connection list, select Bluetooth PAN.
- 5. In the **Network Connection** list, select the connection type.

Select the network connection that the device should use to connect to the Internet.

6. Tap Connect.

- 7. On the computer or laptop, setup a Bluetooth PAN with your device.
 - a. Select Start > Control Panel > Network Connections.
 - b. Under Personal Area Network, select Bluetooth Network Connection.
 - c. Right-click on Bluetooth Network Connection and select View Bluetooth network devices.
 - d. In the Bluetooth Personal Area Network Devices window select your device.

- e. Click Connect. The computer connects to the device via Bluetooth.
- NOTE If your computer is Bluetooth-enabled and you select Bluetooth as the PC connection, you must initiate and complete the Bluetooth PAN partnership before Internet Sharing will work. For more information, refer to Windows Help and Support.
- 8. To verify, on the PC or laptop, launch Internet Explorer and open a web site.
- 9. To end dial-up networking, on the MC9500-K tap Disconnect.

Hands-free Services

To connect to a Bluetooth headset:



NOTE Newer Bluetooth headsets are device dependant and remember the last device they connected to. If problems occur while connecting to the headset, place the headset in discovery mode. Refer to the headset user manual for more information.

Only WAN audio is routed to the headset. System audio is still emitted through the MC9500-K speaker.

You can accept calls and re-dial using the Hands-free profile.

Hands-free profile does not support 3-way calling.

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled and discoverable on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 3. Tap Start > Settings > Connections > Bluetooth icon.
- 4. Tap New device. The MC9500-K searches for Bluetooth devices in the area.
- 5. Select the headset name and tap Next. The Passcode window appears.
- 6. Enter the headset's passcode.
- 7. Tap Next. The MC9500-K connects to the headset. Refer to the headset user manual for instructions on communicating with a Bluetooth device.



NOTE During an active connection, the MC9500-K cannot go into suspend mode when the Power Button is pressed. A message appears notifying the user.

Once the WAN call is disconnected (with Hands-free profile) the Power button is enabled.

Serial Port Services

Use the wireless Bluetooth serial port connection as you would a physical serial cable connection. Configure the application that will use the connection to the correct serial port.

To establish a serial port connection:

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled and discoverable on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 3. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Bluetooth icon > Devices tab.
- 4. Tap Add new device. The MC9500-K begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area.
- 5. Select a device from the list.
- 6. Tap Next. The Enter Passcode window appears.

NOTE If Smart-pairing is configured and the device is requesting one of the pre-defined PINs, the **Enter Passcode** window does not appear.

- 7. Enter the Passcode and the tap Next. The device is added to the Bluetooth list.
- 8. In the device list, tap the serial device. The Partnership Settings window displays.
- 9. Select the Serial Port checkbox.
- 10. Tap Save.
- 11. Tap COM Ports tab.
- 12. Tap New Outgoing Port. The add device window appears.
- 13. Select the serial device in the list and then tap Next.
- 14. Select a COM port from the drop-down list.
- 15. Tap Finish.



NOTE No connection is made at this point. An application must open the selected COM port to trigger Microsoft Bluetooth stack to open the connection.

ActiveSync Using Serial Port Services

Use the wireless Bluetooth serial port connection for ActiveSync just as you would a physical serial cable connection. You must configure the application that will use the connection to the correct serial port.

To set up a Bluetooth ActiveSync connection:

Before setting up a Bluetooth ActiveSync connection, configure the Bluetooth function of your device.



NOTE For additional security, disable network bridging on the computer (specifically, bridging to a Remote NDIS adapter) before connecting to the computer to pass though to the Internet or a network. For more information on network bridging, see **Windows Help** on your computer.

The instructions below are for computers that support the Windows XP SP2 or later version operating system.

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled and discoverable on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 3. On the computer, click Start > Settings > Control Panel.
- 4. Double-click Bluetooth Devices.
- 5. On the Options tab, select the Turn discovery on and Allow Bluetooth devices to connect to this computer checkboxes.

- 11. On the Allow connections to one of the following drop-down list, select the COM port with the number you noted earlier.
- 12. On the MC9500-K, tap Start > Programs > ActiveSync.
- 13. Tap Menu > Connect via Bluetooth.

Synchronization is automatically initiated. The **ActiveSync** icon appears on the lower right corner of the **Today** screen.

If an Authentication is required, the **Enter Passcode** screen appears, type an alphanumeric passkey (PIN code), then tap **Next**; enter the same passkey on the other device.

The passkey is recommended for enhanced security. Your passkey must be between 1 to 16 alphanumeric characters.

If you do not want to use a passkey, tap Next.

- 14. To disconnect the ActiveSync connection, tap the ActiveSync icon on the Today screen.
- 15. Tap Disconnect.

Phone Book Access Profile Services

Phone Book Access profile (PBAP) is used to synchronize contacts between a remote device and the MC9500-K. To establish an PBAP synchronization:

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled and discoverable on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 3. Tap Start > Settings > Connection tab > Bluetooth icon > Devices tab.
- 4. Tap Add New Device. The MC9500-K searches for a Bluetooth device, such as a Car Kit.
- 5. Select a device from the list.
- 6. Tap Next. The Enter Passcode window appears.



NOTE If Smart-pairing is configured and the device is requesting one of the pre-defined PINs, the **Enter Passcode** window does not appear.

7. Enter the Passcode and the tap Next. The device is added to the Bluetooth list.

- 8. A dialog box appears requesting if you want to transfer contacts to the car kit.
- 9. Select Yes or No.
- 10. If Yes is selected, contacts from the MC9500-K are transferred to the car kit.

Dial-Up Networking Services

Dial-up networking allows the user to connect a PC or laptop to the MC9500-K and use the MC9500-K as a modem to connect to an office network or ISP.

Before setting up dial-up networking, obtain dial-up information and other necessary settings (username, password and domain name, if required) for the office network or ISP. To create a new Bluetooth connection:

- 1. Ensure the MC9500-K is discoverable and connectable.
- 2. On the PC or laptop, set up Bluetooth according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- 3. On the PC or laptop Bluetooth software, search for the MC9500-K and select the Dial-up Networking service.

- 5. The MC9500-K phone function dials the ISP number and connects to the ISP.

- 6. Select a HID device from the list.
- 7. Tap Next. The Enter Passcode window appears. Refer to the device's User Manuals for more information.

A2DP/AVRCP Services

- 3. Ensure that the two devices are within 30 feet (10 meters) of one another.
- 4. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Bluetooth icon > Devices tab.

- 5. Tap Add new device. The MC9500-K begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area.
- 6. Select a stereo headset from the list.
- 7. Tap Next. The Enter Passcode window appears. Refer to the device's User Manuals for more information.



NOTE If Smart-pairing is configured and the device is requesting one of the pre-defined PINs, the **Enter Passcode** window does not appear.

8. Tap Connect. The MC9500-K connects to the stereo headset.

For stereo headsets that can use hands-free services, connect to the hands-free service after connecting to the A2DP service:

- 2. Tap Add new device. The MC9500-K begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area.
- 3. Select a stereo headset from the list.



Using StoneStreet One Bluetooth Stack

Turning the Bluetooth Radio Mode On and Off

Turn off the Bluetooth radio to save power or if entering an area with radio restrictions (e.g., an airplane). When the radio is off, other Bluetooth devices cannot see or connect to the MC9500-K. Turn on the Bluetooth radio to exchange information with other Bluetooth devices (within range). Communicate only with Bluetooth radios in close proximity.



Disabling Bluetooth

To disable Bluetooth, tap Bluetooth icon > Disable Bluetooth. The Bluetooth icon changes to indicate that Bluetooth is disabled.

Modes

The BTExplorer application has two modes for managing Bluetooth connections: Wizard Mode and Explorer Mode. The Wizard Mode is for novice Bluetooth users and the Explorer Mode is for experienced Bluetooth users. To switch between modes, select View > Wizard Mode or View > Explorer Mode.

Wizard Mode

Wizard Mode provides a simple process for discovering and connecting to Bluetooth devices.



NOTE Switching between Wizard Mode and Explorer Mode closes all active connections.

Wizard Mode shows the devices and services in a simple Favorites view created by following the step-by-step wizard.

Explorer Mode

The **Explorer Mode** window is easy to navigate and provides greater control to users familiar with Bluetooth. The menu bar provides quick access to the options and tools used to connect to devices. To access Explorer Mode, tap **View > Explorer Mode**.




Figure 7-16 Explorer Mode Window

You can also use the "tap and hold" technique to view available options. Scroll bars and view options are similar to those on the Windows desktop. The tree structure lists the following sub-items:

- Local Device This device
- Remote Device Other Bluetooth devices

 - Untrusted Devices Discovered devices that are not bonded
- Favorites Selected services that are set as Favorite for quick access.




Figure 7-20 Device Services

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




Figure 7-55 BTExplorer Settings - Virtual COM Port Tab




Figure 7-56 BTExplorer Settings - HID Tab

The Motorola Universal Accessory System is a portfolio of accessories that can be easily configured and re-configured when the need arises. The system consists of cradles, chargers, power supplies, cables and mounting brackets.

Single Bay USB Cradle

This section describes how to use a Single Bay USB cradle with the MC9500-K. For power and USB communication setup procedures refer to the *MC9500-K Series Mobile Computer Integrator Guide*.

The Single Bay USB Cradle:

- Provides 5.4 VDC power for operating the MC9500-K.
- Synchronizes information between the MC9500-K and a host computer. Refer to the MC9500-K Mobile Computer Integrator Guide for information on setting up a partnership between the MC9500-K and a host computer.
- Charges the MC9500-K's battery.

Communication and Charging the MC9500-K Battery

To charge the MC9500-K battery and to communicate with a host computer:

- 1. Ensure that the cradle is connected to power and to a host computer.
- 2. Align and hook the MC9500-K interface pocket onto the cradle's cleat.




Figure 8-1 Hooking the MC9500-K onto the Single Bay USB Cradle




Figure 8-2 MC9500-K Battery Charging




Figure 8-3 Single Slot Spare Battery Charging



Charging

- 2. Align and hook the MC9500-K interface pocket onto the cradle's cleat. Optional guide cups can be used to assist in placement of the MC9500-K onto the cradle.






Figure 8-4 Hooking the MC9500-K onto a Four Slot Cradle

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


Figure 8-5 MC9500-K Four Bay Charge Only Cradle with Optional Guide Cups

Four Bay Ethernet Cradle

This section describes how to use a Four Bay Ethernet cradle with the MC9500-K. For setup and cradle communication setup procedures refer to the *MC9500-K Mobile Computer Integrator Guide*.

The Four Bay Ethernet cradle:

- Provides 5.4 VDC power for operating the MC9500-K.
- Connects up to four MC9500-K devices to an Ethernet network.
- Simultaneously charges up to four MC9500-K devices.
- Mounts on a wall or desktop using the appropriate mounting bracket.

Communication and Charging

To charge the MC9500-K battery and communicate with a host computer:

- 1. Ensure that the cradle is connected to power and an Ethernet hub.
- 2. Align and hook the MC9500-K interface pocket onto the cradle's cleat. If available, use the guide to assist in placement of the MC9500-K onto the cradle. See *Figure 8-4 on page 8-7*.




Figure 8-6 Four Bay Ethernet Cradle with Optional Guide Cups

The MC9500-K's Battery Status LED shows the status of the battery charging in the MC9500-K. See *Table 1-1 on page 1-7* for charging status indications. The 4800 mAh battery fully charges in less than six hours.

LED Indicators

Speed LED

The cradle's green Speed LED lights to indicate that the transfer rate is 100 Mbps. When it is not lit it indicates that the transfer rate is 10Mbps.

Link LED

The cradle's yellow Link LED blinks to indicate activity, or stays lit to indicate that a link is established. When it is not lit it indicates there is no link.




Figure 8-7 Four Slot Ethernet Cradle LED Indications

Four Slot Battery Charger

This section describes how to use the Four Slot Battery Charger.

The Four Slot Battery Charger:

- Simultaneously charges up to four MC9500-K batteries.
- Mounts on a wall or desk using the appropriate mounting bracket.

Battery Charging

To charge a battery:

- 1. Ensure that the charger is connected to power.
- 2. Insert a battery into a battery charging slot and gently press the battery into the slot to ensure proper contact.




Figure 8-8 Four Slot Battery Charger

The charging status is indicated on the front of the battery. See *Table 2-7 on page 2-8* for charging status indications. The 4800 mAh battery fully charges in less than six hours.

Vehicle Cradle

This section describes how to use a vehicle cradle with the MC9500-K. For cradle installation and communication setup procedures refer to the VCD9500 Vehicle Cradle Quick Reference Guide.

Once installed in a vehicle, the cradle:

- holds the MC9500-K securely in place
- provides power for operating the MC9500-K
- re-charges the battery in the MC9500-K.

Charging the MC9500-K Battery

Insert the MC9500-K into the vehicle cradle with the display facing out.

Push back the level forward to lock the MC9500-K into place. The MC9500-K automatically begins charging.

NOTE The MC9500-K will not begin charging unless the side level is locked into place.

Vehicle Battery Charger

This section describes how to use the Vehicle Battery Charger.

Charging the Battery

To charge a spare battery:

- 1. Ensure that the charger is connected to power.
- 2. Insert the spare battery into the slot to begin charging.

Release Button




Figure 8-10 Vehicle Battery Charger

The charging status is indicated on the front of the battery. See *Table 2-7 on page 2-8* for charging status indications. The 4800 mAh battery fully charges in less than six hours.

To remove the battery, press the release button. The battery ejects from the charger.

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Magnetic Stripe Reader

This section describes how to set up and use the snap-on (Magnetic Stripe Reader (MSR) with the MC9500-K. The MSR snaps on to the back of the MC9500-K and removes easily when not in use.

When attached to the MC9500-K, the MSR allows the MC9500-K to capture data from magnetic stripe cards. To download sample MSR data capture software, visit the Support Central web site.

To charge to MC9500-K with the MSR attached,



NOTE While the MC9500-K with MSR is attached to ta Single Bay USB Cradle, a Four Bay Ethernet Cradle or a USB/Charging Cable, Operation of the MSR is disabled.

If attaching the MC9500-K with the MSR onto a Four Bay Cradle, remove the optional guide cup before attaching the MC9500-K.

Attaching and Removing the MSR

To attach, slide the cleat of the MSR into the interface pocket of the MC9500-K and snap into place.




Figure 8-11 MSR Installation

To remove the MSR, press the release button and lift off the MC9500-K.

Using the MSR

Install an MSR enabled application onto the MC9500-K.

To use the MSR:

- 1. Attach the MSR to the MC9500-K.
- 2. Power on the MC9500-K.
- 3. Launch the MSR application.

4. Swipe the magnetic stripe card through the MSR, with the magnetic stripe on the card facing away from the MC9500-K. Swipe the card in either direction, up and down or down and up. For best results, gently press the card against the back of the MSR while swiping to ensure contact with the reader.




Figure 8-12 Swipe Card through MSR

5. The application indicates if the data has been read correctly.

Cables

This section describes how to set up and use the cables. The cables are available with a variety of connection capabilities.

The following communication/charge cables are available:

- USB/Charge cable
 - Provide the MC9500-K with operating and charging power when used with the Motorola approved power supply.
 - Synchronize information between the MC9500-K and a host computer. With customized or third party software, it can also synchronize the MC9500-K with corporate databases.




Figure 8-13 USB/Charge Cable

- Charge Only cable
 - Provide the MC9500-K with operating and charging power when used with the Motorola approved power supply.
- Single Bay Cradle/Charger Y Cable
 - Provide the power to a Single Bay USB Cradle and Single Slot Battery Charger or two Single Slot Battery Chargers off one power supply when used with the Motorola approved power supply.




Figure 8-14 Single Slot Cradle/Charger Y-Cable

- Auto Charge cable.
 - Provides the MC9500-K or Vehicle Battery Charger with operating and charging power tough a cigarette lighter.




Figure 8-15 Auto Charge Cable




Figure 8-16 Cable Installation

Battery Charging and Operating Power

The communication/charge cables can charge the MC9500-K battery and supply operating power.

To charge the MC9500-K battery:

- 1. Connect the cable power input connector to the Motorola approved power source.
- 2. Align the cleat on the cable with the interface pocket on the back of the MC9500-K.

The MC9500-K amber Battery Status LED indicates the MC9500-K battery charging status. The 4800 mAh battery charges in less than six hours. See *Table 1-1 on page 1-7* for charging status indications.

3. When charging is complete, press the release button up and remove the cable from the MC9500-K.

Chapter 9 Maintenance & Troubleshooting

Introduction

This chapter includes instructions on cleaning and storing the MC9500-K, and provides troubleshooting solutions for potential problems during MC9500-K operation.

Maintaining the MC9500-K

For trouble-free service, observe the following tips when using the MC9500-K:

Do not scratch the screen of the MC9500-K. When working with the MC9500-K, use the supplied stylus or
plastic-tipped pens intended for use with a touch-sensitive screen. Never use an actual pen or pencil or other
sharp object on the surface of the MC9500-K screen.

Motorola recommends using a screen protector, p/n KT-122010-01R.

- The touch-sensitive screen of the MC9500-K is polycarbonate. Do not to drop the MC9500-K or subject it to strong impact.
- Protect the MC9500-K from temperature extremes. Do not leave it on the dashboard of a car on a hot day, and keep it away from heat sources.
- Do not store the MC9500-K in any location that is dusty, damp or wet.
- Use a soft lens cloth to clean the MC9500-K. If the surface of the MC9500-K screen becomes soiled, clean it with a soft cloth moistened with a diluted window-cleaning solution.
- Periodically replace the rechargeable battery to ensure maximum battery life and product performance. Battery life depends on individual usage patterns. The battery provides health status to assist in determining useful battery life. See *Chapter 2, Battery Management* for more information.
- Do not scratch the exit window. Clean the window periodically. Dust, contamination, and scratches on the exit
 window can cause visible blemishes in the images captured with the Imager.

- A screen protector is applied to the MC9500-K. Motorola recommends using this to minimize wear and tear. Screen protectors enhance the usability and durability of touch screen displays. Benefits include:
 - · Protection from scratches and gouges
 - Durable writing and touch surface with tactile feel
 - Abrasion and chemical resistance
 - Glare reduction
 - · Keeping the device's screen looking new
 - Quick and easy installation.

Removing the Screen Protector

A screen protector is applied to the MC9500-K. Motorola recommends using this to minimize wear and tear. Screen protectors enhance the usability and durability of touch screen displays.

To remove the screen protector, lift the corner using a thin plastic card, such as a credit card, then carefully lift it off the display.

CAUTION Do not use a sharp object to remove the protector. Doing so can damage the display.

NOTE Not using a screen protector can affect warranty coverage. To purchase replacement protectors, contact your local account manager or Motorola, Inc. These include screen protector installation instructions. Part number: KT-122010-01R Screen Protector 3/pk.

Battery Safety Guidelines

- The area in which the units are charged should be clear of debris and combustible materials or chemicals. Particular care should be taken where the device is charged in a non commercial environment.
- Follow battery usage, storage, and charging guidelines found in the user's guide.
- Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.

- To charge the mobile device battery, the battery and charger temperatures must be between +32 °F and +104 °F (0 °C and +40 °C)
- Do not use incompatible batteries and chargers. Use of an incompatible battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. If you have any questions about the compatibility of a battery or a charger, contact Motorola Enterprise Mobility support.
- For devices that utilize a USB port as a charging source, the device shall only be connected to products that bear the USB-IF logo or have completed the USB-IF compliance program.
- To enable authentication of an approved battery, as required by IEEE1725 clause 10.2.1, all batteries will carry a Motorola hologram. Do not fit any battery without checking it has the Motorola authentication hologram.
- Do not disassemble or open, crush, bend or deform, puncture, or shred.
- Severe impact from dropping any battery-operated device on a hard surface could cause the battery to overheat.
- Do not short circuit a battery or allow metallic or conductive objects to contact the battery terminals.
- Do not modify or remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, immerse or expose to water or other liquids, or expose to fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Do not leave or store the equipment in or near areas that might get very hot, such as in a parked vehicle or near a radiator or other heat source. Do not place battery into a microwave oven or dryer.

Materials Required

- Alcohol wipes
- Lens tissue
- Cotton tipped applicators

- Isopropyl alcohol
- Can of compressed air with a tube.

Cleaning the MC9500-K

Housing

Using the alcohol wipes, wipe the housing including keys and in-between keys.

Display

The display can be wiped down with the alcohol wipes, but care should be taken not to allow any pooling of liquid around the edges of the display. Immediately dry the display with a soft, non-abrasive cloth to prevent streaking.

Scanner Exit Window

Wipe the scanner exit window periodically with a lens tissue or other material suitable for cleaning optical material such as eyeglasses.

Interface Connector

- 1. Remove the battery from MC9500-K. See Replacing the Battery on page 1-8.
- 2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- 3. Rub the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator back-and-forth across the interface connector on the back of the MC9500-K. Do not leave any cotton residue on the connector.
- 4. Repeat at least three times.
- 5. Use the cotton tipped applicator dipped in alcohol to remove any grease and dirt near the connector area.
- 6. Use a dry cotton tipped applicator and repeat steps 3 through 5.
- Spray compressed air on the connector area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface. CAUTION: Do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is away from your face.
- 8. Inspect the area for any grease or dirt, repeat if required.
- 9. Replace the battery.

Battery Contacts

- 1. Remove the battery from MC9500-K. See Replacing the Battery on page 1-8.
- 2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- 3. Rub the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator back-and-forth across the battery contacts on the back of the battery. Do not leave any cotton residue on the contacts.
- 4. Repeat at least three times.
- 5. Use the cotton tipped applicator dipped in alcohol to remove any grease and dirt near the contact area.
- 6. Use a dry cotton tipped applicator and repeat steps 3 through 5.
- 7. Spray compressed air on the contact area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface. CAUTION: Do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is away from your face.

- 8. Inspect the area for any grease or dirt, repeat if required.
- 9. Replace the battery in the MC9500-K.

Cleaning Cradle Connectors

To clean the connectors on a cradle:

- 1. Remove the DC power cable from the cradle.
- 2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- 3. Rub the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator along the pins of the connector(s). Slowly move the applicator back-and-forth from one side of the connector to the other. Do not let any cotton residue on the connector.
- 4. All sides of the connector should also be rubbed with the cotton tipped applicator.
- Spray compressed air in the connector area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface.
 CAUTION: do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is pointed away from your face.
- 6. Ensure that there is no lint left by the cotton tipped applicator, remove lint if found.
- 7. If grease and other dirt can be found on other areas of the cradle, use lint free cloth and alcohol to remove.
- 8. Allow at least 10 to 30 minutes (depending on ambient temperature and humidity) for the alcohol to air dry before applying power to cradle.

If the temperature is low and humidity is high, longer drying time is required. Warm temperature and dry humidity requires less drying time.

Cleaning Frequency

The cleaning frequency is up to the customer's discretion due to the varied environments in which the mobile devices are used. They may be cleaned as frequently as required. However when used in dirty environments it may be advisable to periodically clean the scanner exit window to ensure optimum scanning performance.

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Appendix B Voice Quality Manager

Introduction

The Voice Quality Manager (VQM) is a software package that resides on the MC95XX. VQM enables a set of features for Voice over WiFi (VoWiFi) calls, and a sub-set of those features for cellular line calls. The VQM user interface is designed to be intuitive and easy to use, so complex tasks such as enabling the Acoustic Echo Canceller (AEC) while a call is in progress are done with very little or no user intervention.

Features

The VQM software:

- · Improves the voice transmission quality without using additional battery power.
- Turns on the AEC for VoWiFi calls automatically, without user intervention.
- · Prioritizes the outgoing audio IP packets.
- Provides user-selectable audio modes (speakerphone and handset) with a single tap of the VQM icon. A VQM icon in the title bar of the device indicates the audio mode currently in use.
- NDIS 5.1 compliant.

Enabling VQM

To enable VQM:

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > File Explorer.
- 2. Navigate to the Windows folder.
- 3. Locate the file VQMAudioNotify.
- 4. Tap the filename to enable VQM.

Audio Modes

The MC95XX can be in any one of the seven different audio modes. The mode is visually indicated by the VQM icon on the title bar.




Figure B-1 VQM Icon in Title Bar

Depending upon the audio mode being used, the mode can be changed by tapping the VQM icon in the title bar. The audio mode can only be changed only while the user is on a call.

The table below lists the current audio mode and the subsequent audio mode after tapping the VQM icon.

If the audio mode is set to speakerphone and the user taps the VQM icon, the audio mode changes to handset.

If the user is using a Bluetooth headset, tapping the VQM icon un-pairs the Bluetooth headset from the device causing the audio to be routed to the default mode. In VQM 2.5, there is no way to go back to the Bluetooth headset using the VQM icon if it is un-paired The only way to reconnect the Bluetooth headset to the device is by using the BTExplorer application.

If the user taps the VQM icon when a wired headset is connected to the mobile device, the audio mode does not change. The audio continues to get routed to the wired headset.

If the user taps the VQM icon while not on a call there is not change to the audio mode.

Tap and hold the VQM icon in the title bar to display a notification dialog box that contains:

- · AEC: The Acoustic Echo Canceller status
- DSCP Marked Packets: The number of outbound voice packets that have been recognized and marked as high priority by VQM.
- · VQM Version: The VQM version number.

Voice Packet Prioritization

IP soft phones transmit voice packets in the same manner as any other application that sends data over the network. On a network with different types of traffic, voice packets are given the same priority as any other traffic, and therefore may be subject to delays.

WiFi Multi-media (WMM) is a solution to this problem. WMM is a specification that supports prioritizing traffic, and "higher-priority" packets can be given preferential treatment.

To make use of WMM, the devices that generate traffic must mark their packets as high or normal priority in a field in the IP packet called Differentiated Services Code-Point (DSCP). The wireless infrastructure, which must be configured to support WMM, gives a higher priority to packets that have been marked as high priority through DSCP marking by the devices that generate traffic.

VQM detects if there is an ongoing Voice over WiFi (VoWiFi) call, and if so, marks outgoing voice packets (Only outgoing voice packets can be marked. The incoming voice packets have already been through the network, so it makes no sense to mark them.) as high-priority using DSCP. This enables WMM-compatible wireless infrastructure to treat the voice packets preferentially. This results in fewer delays for voice packets, which in turn improves the call quality.

Limitations

- There is no VPN support in VQM.
- · Only the Avaya softphone is currently supported.

Acoustic Echo Cancellation

Acoustic Echo occurs during a voice call when the audio from the earpiece enters the microphone of the same device. This results in the person at the other end hearing back a delayed version of his/her own voice ("Echo"). Needless to say, "Echo" is not desirable, and needs to be suppressed. This is the functionality performed by the Acoustic Echo Canceller (AEC). There are two approaches to suppressing the Echo:

- Turn the Acoustic Echo Canceller (AEC) on permanently. This approach is not very efficient because the device consumes more power when the AEC is on.
- Turn the Acoustic Echo Canceller (AEC) on only when there is an ongoing call.

VQM follows the second of the two approaches mentioned above.

VQM automatically turns on the Acoustic Echo Canceller (AEC) when the mobile device is in a VoWiFi call. When the call is terminated, VQM turns the AEC off. Note that the AEC is turned on for speakerphone and handset modes and does not get turned on for wired headset and Bluetooth headset modes. The AEC is not required for wired headset because the audio volume is quite low (because of the proximity of the earpiece to the ear), and therefore it is very unlikely for the audio from the earpiece to go in to the mouthpiece. Bluetooth headsets typically have an Echo Canceller built in. Turning the AEC on only while on a call saves battery power, compared to leaving the AEC turned on permanently.

The AEC is not turned on for Cellular calls because the WWAN phone application has a built-in echo canceller.

Disabling VQM

To disable VQM perform a warm boot.






Figure C-2 Alpha Numeric Keypad Configuration




Figure C-3 Calculator Numeric Keypad Configuration




Figure C-4 Telephony Numeric Keypad Configuration

Α

API. An interface by means of which one software component communicates with or controls another. Usually used to refer to services provided by one software component to another, usually via software interrupts or function calls

Aperture. The opening in an optical system defined by a lens or baffle that establishes the field of view.

Application Programming Interface. See API.

- **ANSI Terminal.** A display terminal that follows commands in the ANSI standard terminal language. For example, it uses escape sequences to control the cursor, clear the screen and set colors. Communications programs support the ANSI terminal mode and often default to this terminal emulation for dial-up connections to online services.
- **ASCII.** American Standard Code for Information Interchange. A 7 bit-plus-parity code representing 128 letters, numerals, punctuation marks and control characters. It is a standard data transmission code in the U.S.
- Autodiscrimination. The ability of an interface controller to determine the code type of a scanned bar code. After this determination is made, the information content is decoded.

Bar. The dark element in a printed bar code symbol.

Bar Code. A pattern of variable-width bars and spaces which represents numeric or alphanumeric data in machine-readable form. The general format of a bar code symbol consists of a leading margin, start character, data or message character, check character (if any), stop character, and trailing margin. Within this framework, each recognizable symbology uses its own unique format. See **Symbology**.

Bar Code Density. The number of characters represented per unit of measurement (e.g., characters per inch).

Bar Height. The dimension of a bar measured perpendicular to the bar width.

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- Bar Width. Thickness of a bar measured from the edge closest to the symbol start character to the trailing edge of the same bar.
- **BIOS.** Basic Input Output System. A collection of ROM-based code with a standard API used to interface with standard PC hardware.
- **Bit.** Binary digit. One bit is the basic unit of binary information. Generally, eight consecutive bits compose one byte of data. The pattern of 0 and 1 values within the byte determines its meaning.

Bits per Second (bps). Bits transmitted or received.

- **BOOTP.** A protocol for remote booting of diskless devices. Assigns an IP address to a machine and may specify a boot file. The client sends a bootp request as a broadcast to the bootp server port (67) and the bootp server responds using the bootp client port (68). The bootp server must have a table of all devices, associated MAC addresses and IP addresses.
- **boot or boot-up.** The process a computer goes through when it starts. During boot-up, the computer can run self-diagnostic tests and configure hardware and software.

bps. See Bits Per Second.

Byte. On an addressable boundary, eight adjacent binary digits (0 and 1) combined in a pattern to represent a specific character or numeric value. Bits are numbered from the right, 0 through 7, with bit 0 the low-order bit. One byte in memory is used to store one ASCII character.

- **CDRH.** Center for Devices and Radiological Health. A federal agency responsible for regulating laser product safety. This agency specifies various laser operation classes based on power output during operation.
- **CDRH Class 1.** This is the lowest power CDRH laser classification. This class is considered intrinsically safe, even if all laser output were directed into the eye's pupil. There are no special operating procedures for this class.
- **CDRH Class 2.** No additional software mechanisms are needed to conform to this limit. Laser operation in this class poses no danger for unintentional direct human exposure.
- **Character.** A pattern of bars and spaces which either directly represents data or indicates a control function, such as a number, letter, punctuation mark, or communications control contained in a message.
- Character Set. Those characters available for encoding in a particular bar code symbology.
- **Check Digit.** A digit used to verify a correct symbol decode. The scanner inserts the decoded data into an arithmetic formula and checks that the resulting number matches the encoded check digit. Check digits are required for UPC but are optional for other symbologies. Using check digits decreases the chance of substitution errors when a symbol is decoded.
- **Codabar.** A discrete self-checking code with a character set consisting of digits 0 to 9 and six additional characters: ("-", "\$", ":", ",", ",", "+").
- **Code 128.** A high density symbology which allows the controller to encode all 128 ASCII characters without adding extra symbol elements.

- **Code 3 of 9 (Code 39).** A versatile and widely used alphanumeric bar code symbology with a set of 43 character types, including all uppercase letters, numerals from 0 to 9 and 7 special characters ("-", ".", "/", "+", "%", "\$" and space). The code name is derived from the fact that 3 of 9 elements representing a character are wide, while the remaining 6 are narrow.
- **Code 93.** An industrial symbology compatible with Code 39 but offering a full character ASCII set and a higher coding density than Code 39.
- **Code Length.** Number of data characters in a bar code between the start and stop characters, not including those characters.
- Cold Boot. A cold boot restarts the mobile computer and erases all user stored records and entries.
- **COM port.** Communication port; ports are identified by number, e.g., COM1, COM2.
- **Continuous Code.** A bar code or symbol in which all spaces within the symbol are parts of characters. There are no intercharacter gaps in a continuous code. The absence of gaps allows for greater information density.
- **Cradle.** A cradle is used for charging the terminal battery and for communicating with a host computer, and provides a storage place for the terminal when not in use.

D

- Data Communications Equipment (DCE). A device (such as a modem) which is designed to attach directly to a DTE (Data Terminal Equipment) device.
- DCE. See Data Communications Equipment.
- DCP. See Device Configuration Package.
- **Dead Zone.** An area within a scanner's field of view, in which specular reflection may prevent a successful decode.
- **Decode.** To recognize a bar code symbology (e.g., UPC/EAN) and then analyze the content of the specific bar code scanned.
- **Decode Algorithm.** A decoding scheme that converts pulse widths into data representation of the letters or numbers encoded within a bar code symbol.
- Decryption. Decryption is the decoding and unscrambling of received encrypted data. Also see, Encryption and Key.
- **Depth of Field.** The range between minimum and maximum distances at which a scanner can read a symbol with a certain minimum element width.
- **Device Configuration Package.** The Symbol Device Configuration Package provides the Product Reference Guide (PRG), flash partitions, Terminal Configuration Manager (TCM) and the associated TCM scripts. With this package hex images that represent flash partitions can be created and downloaded to the mobile computer.

Discrete Code. A bar code or symbol in which the spaces between characters (intercharacter gaps) are not part of the code.

Discrete 2 of 5. A binary bar code symbology representing each character by a group of five bars, two of which are wide. The location of wide bars in the group determines which character is encoded; spaces are insignificant. Only numeric characters (0 to 9) and START/STOP characters may be encoded.

DRAM. Dynamic random access memory.

DTE. See Data Terminal Equipment.

Ε

EAN. European Article Number. This European/International version of the UPC provides its own coding format and symbology standards. Element dimensions are specified metrically. EAN is used primarily in retail.

Element. Generic term for a bar or space.

Encoded Area. Total linear dimension occupied by all characters of a code pattern, including start/stop characters and data.

ENQ (RS-232). ENQ software handshaking is also supported for the data sent to the host.

ESD. Electro-Static Discharge

F

File Transfer Protocol (FTP). A TCP/IP application protocol governing file transfer via network or telephone lines. See TCP/IP.

Flash Disk. An additional megabyte of non-volatile memory for storing application and configuration files.

Flash Memory. Flash memory is nonvolatile, semi-permanent storage that can be electronically erased in the circuit and reprogrammed. Series 9000 mobile computers use Flash memory to store the operating system (ROM-DOS), the terminal emulators, and the Citrix ICA Client for DOS.

FTP. See File Transfer Protocol.

Η

Hard Reset. See Cold Boot.

Hz. Hertz; A unit of frequency equal to one cycle per second.

Host Computer. A computer that serves other terminals in a network, providing such services as computation, database access, supervisory programs and network control.

- IDE. Intelligent drive electronics. Refers to the solid-state hard drive type.
- **IEC.** International Electrotechnical Commission. This international agency regulates laser safety by specifying various laser operation classes based on power output during operation.
- **IEC (825) Class 1.** This is the lowest power IEC laser classification. Conformity is ensured through a software restriction of 120 seconds of laser operation within any 1000 second window and an automatic laser shutdown if the scanner's oscillating mirror fails.

IEEE Address. See MAC Address.

- **Input/Output Ports.** I/O ports are primarily dedicated to passing information into or out of the mobile computer's memory. Series 9500 mobile computers include a USB port.
- Interleaved 2 of 5. A binary bar code symbology representing character pairs in groups of five bars and five interleaved spaces. Interleaving provides for greater information density. The location of wide elements (bar/spaces) within each group determines which characters are encoded. This continuous code type uses no intercharacter spaces. Only numeric (0 to 9) and START/STOP characters may be encoded.
- Intercharacter Gap. The space between two adjacent bar code characters in a discrete code.
- **Interleaved Bar Code.** A bar code in which characters are paired together, using bars to represent the first character and the intervening spaces to represent the second.

Internet Protocol Address. See IP.

IOCTL. Input/Output Control.

- **I/O Ports.** interface The connection between two devices, defined by common physical characteristics, signal characteristics, and signal meanings. Types of interfaces include RS-232 and PCMCIA.
- IP. Internet Protocol. The IP part of the TCP/IP communications protocol. IP implements the network layer (layer 3) of the protocol, which contains a network address and is used to route a message to a different network or subnetwork. IP accepts "packets" from the layer 4 transport protocol (TCP or UDP), adds its own header to it and delivers a "datagram" to the layer 2 data link protocol. It may also break the packet into fragments to support the maximum transmission unit (MTU) of the network.
- **IP Address.** (Internet Protocol address) The address of a computer attached to an IP network. Every client and server station must have a unique IP address. A 32-bit address used by a computer on a IP network. Client workstations have either a permanent address or one that is dynamically assigned to them each session. IP addresses are written as four sets of numbers separated by periods; for example, 204.171.64.2.
- IPX/SPX. Internet Package Exchange/Sequential Packet Exchange. A communications protocol for Novell. IPX is Novell's Layer 3 protocol, similar to XNS and IP, and used in NetWare networks. SPX is Novell's version of the Xerox SPP protocol.
- **IS-95.** Interim Standard 95. The EIA/TIA standard that governs the operation of CDMA cellular service. Versions include IS-95A and IS-95B. See CDMA.

Κ

Key. A key is the specific code used by the algorithm to encrypt or decrypt the data. Also see, Encryption and Decrypting.

L

- LASER. Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation. The laser is an intense light source. Light from a laser is all the same frequency, unlike the output of an incandescent bulb. Laser light is typically coherent and has a high energy density.
- Laser Diode. A semiconductor type of laser connected to a power source to generate a laser beam. This laser type is a compact source of coherent light.
- laser scanner. A type of bar code reader that uses a beam of laser light.

LCD. See Liquid Crystal Display.

LED Indicator. A semiconductor diode (LED - Light Emitting Diode) used as an indicator, often in digital displays. The semiconductor uses applied voltage to produce light of a certain frequency determined by the semiconductor's particular chemical composition.

Light Emitting Diode. See LED.

Liquid Crystal Display (LCD). A display that uses liquid crystal sealed between two glass plates. The crystals are excited by precise electrical charges, causing them to reflect light outside according to their bias. They use little electricity and react relatively quickly. They require external light to reflect their information to the user.

Μ

MC. Mobile Computer.

- **MDN.** Mobile Directory Number. The directory listing telephone number that is dialed (generally using POTS) to reach a mobile unit. The MDN is usually associated with a MIN in a cellular telephone -- in the US and Canada, the MDN and MIN are the same value for voice cellular users. International roaming considerations often result in the MDN being different from the MIN.
- **MIL.** 1 mil = 1 thousandth of an inch.
- **MIN.** Mobile Identification Number. The unique account number associated with a cellular device. It is broadcast by the cellular device when accessing the cellular system.
- **Misread (Misdecode).** A condition which occurs when the data output of a reader or interface controller does not agree with the data encoded within a bar code symbol.
- **Mobile Computer.** In this text, *mobile computer* refers to the Symbol Series 9000 wireless portable computer. It can be set up to run as a stand-alone device, or it can be set up to communicate with a network, using wireless radio technology.

Ν

- **Nominal.** The exact (or ideal) intended value for a specified parameter. Tolerances are specified as positive and negative deviations from this value.
- **Nominal Size.** Standard size for a bar code symbol. Most UPC/EAN codes are used over a range of magnifications (e.g., from 0.80 to 2.00 of nominal).

NVM. Non-Volatile Memory.

0

ODI. See Open Data-Link Interface.

Open Data-Link Interface (ODI). Novell's driver specification for an interface between network hardware and higher-level protocols. It supports multiple protocols on a single NIC (Network Interface Controller). It is capable of understanding and translating any network information or request sent by any other ODI-compatible protocol into something a NetWare client can understand and process.

Open System Authentication. Open System authentication is a null authentication algorithm.

Ρ

PAN. Personal area network. Using Bluetooth wireless technology, PANs enable devices to communicate wirelessly. Generally, a wireless PAN consists of a dynamic group of less than 255 devices that communicate within about a 33-foot range. Only devices within this limited area typically participate in the network.

Parameter. A variable that can have different values assigned to it.

PC Card. A plug-in expansion card for laptop computers and other devices, also called a PCMCIA card. PC Cards are 85.6mm long x 54 mm wide, and have a 68 pin connector. There are several different kinds:

Type I; 3.3 mm high; use - RAM or Flash RAM

Type II; 5 mm high; use - modems, LAN adaptors

Type III; 10.5 high; use - Hard Disks

PCMCIA. Personal Computer Memory Card Interface Association. See PC Card.

- **Percent Decode.** The average probability that a single scan of a bar code would result in a successful decode. In a well-designed bar code scanning system, that probability should approach near 100%.
- **PING.** (Packet Internet Groper) An Internet utility used to determine whether a particular IP address is online. It is used to test and debug a network by sending out a packet and waiting for a response.

Print Contrast Signal (PCS). Measurement of the contrast (brightness difference) between the bars and spaces of a symbol. A minimum PCS value is needed for a bar code symbol to be scannable. PCS = (RL - RD) / RL, where RL is the reflectance factor of the background and RD the reflectance factor of the dark bars.

Programming Mode. The state in which a scanner is configured for parameter values. See Scanning Mode.

Q

- Quiet Zone. A clear space, containing no dark marks, which precedes the start character of a bar code symbol and follows the stop character.
- **QWERTY.** A standard keyboard commonly used on North American and some European PC keyboards. "QWERTY" refers to the arrangement of keys on the left side of the third row of keys.

R

RAM. Random Access Memory. Data in RAM can be accessed in random order, and quickly written and read.

- Reflectance. Amount of light returned from an illuminated surface.
- **Resolution.** The narrowest element dimension which is distinguished by a particular reading device or printed with a particular device or method.
- RF. Radio Frequency.
- ROM. Read-Only Memory. Data stored in ROM cannot be changed or removed.
- **Router.** A device that connects networks and supports the required protocols for packet filtering. Routers are typically used to extend the range of cabling and to organize the topology of a network into subnets. See **Subnet**.
- **RS-232.** An Electronic Industries Association (EIA) standard that defines the connector, connector pins, and signals used to transfer data serially from one device to another.

S

Scan Area. Area intended to contain a symbol.

- Scanner. An electronic device used to scan bar code symbols and produce a digitized pattern that corresponds to the bars and spaces of the symbol. Its three main components are: 1) Light source (laser or photoelectric cell) - illuminates a bar code,; 2) Photodetector - registers the difference in reflected light (more light reflected from spaces); 3) Signal conditioning circuit - transforms optical detector output into a digitized bar pattern.
- Scanning Mode. The scanner is energized, programmed and ready to read a bar code.
- Scanning Sequence. A method of programming or configuring parameters for a bar code reading system by scanning bar code menus.

SDK. Software Development Kit

- Self-Checking Code. A symbology that uses a checking algorithm to detect encoding errors within the characters of a bar code symbol.
- Shared Key. Shared Key authentication is an algorithm where both the AP and the MU share an authentication key.

SHIP. Symbol Host Interface Program.

- **SID.** System Identification code. An identifier issued by the FCC for each market. It is also broadcast by the cellular carriers to allow cellular devices to distinguish between the home and roaming service.
- SMDK. Symbol Mobility Developer's Kit.

Soft Reset. See Warm Boot.

Space. The lighter element of a bar code formed by the background between bars.

Specular Reflection. The mirror-like direct reflection of light from a surface, which can cause difficulty decoding a bar code.

- **Start/Stop Character.** A pattern of bars and spaces that provides the scanner with start and stop reading instructions and scanning direction. The start and stop characters are normally to the left and right margins of a horizontal code.
- STEP. Symbol Terminal Enabler Program.
- Subnet. A subset of nodes on a network that are serviced by the same router. See Router.
- Subnet Mask. A 32-bit number used to separate the network and host sections of an IP address. A custom subnet mask subdivides an IP network into smaller subsections. The mask is a binary pattern that is matched up with the IP address to turn part of the host ID address field into a field for subnets. Default is often 255.255.255.0.
- Substrate. A foundation material on which a substance or image is placed.
- SVTP. Symbol Virtual Terminal Program.
- **Symbol.** A scannable unit that encodes data within the conventions of a certain symbology, usually including start/stop characters, quiet zones, data characters and check characters.
- Symbol Aspect Ratio. The ratio of symbol height to symbol width.
- Symbol Height. The distance between the outside edges of the quiet zones of the first row and the last row.
- **Symbol Length.** Length of symbol measured from the beginning of the quiet zone (margin) adjacent to the start character to the end of the quiet zone (margin) adjacent to a stop character.
- **Symbology.** The structural rules and conventions for representing data within a particular bar code type (e.g. UPC/EAN, Code 39, PDF417, etc.).

Т

- **TCP/IP.** (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol) A communications protocol used to internetwork dissimilar systems. This standard is the protocol of the Internet and has become the global standard for communications. TCP provides transport functions, which ensures that the total amount of bytes sent is received correctly at the other end. UDP is an alternate transport that does not guarantee delivery. It is widely used for real-time voice and video transmissions where erroneous packets are not retransmitted. IP provides the routing mechanism. TCP/IP is a routable protocol, which means that all messages contain not only the address of the destination station, but the address of a destination network. This allows TCP/IP messages to be sent to multiple networks within an organization or around the world, hence its use in the worldwide Internet. Every client and server in a TCP/IP network requires an IP address, which is either permanently assigned or dynamically assigned at startup.
- **Telnet.** A terminal emulation protocol commonly used on the Internet and TCP/IP-based networks. It allows a user at a terminal or computer to log onto a remote device and run a program.

Terminal. See Mobile Computer.

- **Terminal Emulation.** A "terminal emulation" emulates a character-based mainframe session on a remote non-mainframe terminal, including all display features, commands and function keys. The VC5000 Series supports Terminal Emulations in 3270, 5250 and VT220.
- Terminate and Stay Resident (TSR). A program under DOS that ends its foreground execution to remain resident in memory to service hardware/software interrupts, providing background operation. It remains in memory and may provide services on behalf of other DOS programs.
- **TFTP.** (Trivial File Transfer Protocol) A version of the TCP/IP FTP (File Transfer Protocol) protocol that has no directory or password capability. It is the protocol used for upgrading firmware, downloading software and remote booting of diskless devices.

Tolerance. Allowable deviation from the nominal bar or space width.

Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol. See TCP/IP.

Trivial File Transfer Protocol. See TFTP.

TSR. See Terminate and Stay Resident.

U

UPC. Universal Product Code. A relatively complex numeric symbology. Each character consists of two bars and two spaces, each of which is any of four widths. The standard symbology for retail food packages in the United States.

UDP. User Datagram Protocol. A protocol within the IP protocol suite that is used in place of TCP when a reliable delivery is not required. For example, UDP is used for real-time audio and video traffic where lost packets are simply ignored, because there is no time to retransmit. If UDP is used and a reliable delivery is required, packet sequence checking and error notification must be written into the applications.

V

Visible Laser Diode (VLD). A solid state device which produces visible laser light.

W

Warm Boot. A warm boot restarts the mobile computer by closing all running programs. All data that is not saved to flash memory is lost.

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
